4. OUT OF BOUNDS

1. The area inside barbed wire fence around R.Q.M. Stores is out of bounds to all ranks. Petrol coal and oil stores included.

6. DISCIPLINE - SELF INELICTED INJURIES - F.G.C.M.
O.S. RO 2461

1. On 29 May 42. G 19119 Pte. Balanger, L., 1 Cdn Div Inf Reinf. Unit (Carl & Yonk) was tried by F.G.C.M. on a charge under A.A. Sec 18(2) for the offence of wilfully maiming himself with the intent of rendering himself unfit for service.
2. He was convicted and sentenced to be imprisoned for 2 years.

7. OMNIBUS WARRANTS - ISSUE OF
O/S RO 2465

1. Omnibus warrants A.B. 515 are now available for duty or leave journeys.
2. Leave or duty journeys will be by train whenever practicable. Bus warrants may be issued for travel at either or both ends of a rail journey wherever the distance not covered by rail is over five miles in either case. Bus warrants will be issued to or from the nearest railway stn only.
3. An initial issue will be made to formations and units. Indents for future supplies will be included in units monthly demands from Movement Control CMHQ.
4. Instructions regarding the use, completion and safe custody of warrant books will be the same as those at present in effect for railway warrants and will be strictly adhered to. Charges will be shown payable by the Command Paymaster of the Command in which the unit is situated and all warrants issued must be endorsed "Cdn Forces in U.K."
5. Omnibus warrants will be accepted by the majority of omnibus Units should ascertain the posn as regards local companies.
6. In cases where the omnibus companies are not willing to accept warrants, a refund for the return bus journey may be claimed by submitting a travelling claim supported by a receipt for the bus fare showing the name of the railway stn, name of place of destination, and mileage, Warrants which have been refused by the omnibus companies concerned, will be returned to the issuing officer for cancellation.
7. Subject to their acceptance by the tpt companies concerned, omnibus warrants will be used for journeys by tram and trolley bus. They are NOT available for use in the road tpt system of the London Passenger Tpt Board.
8. At the time of issue of each omnibus warrant, A.B. 515 the names regimental numbers, ranks and units of personnel for whom it is issued will be inserted on the reverse side of the stub.

9. DISCIPLINE
D.R.O. 1862

1. Amendment No. 30 to M.M.L. adding at end of note 4 to sec 137A the following: "In the case, however, of the continuing wrongful act of improperly using W.D. property e.g., a motor vehicle any loss or damage happening to such property during the continuance of such user may be held to be occasioned thereby".
In future all charges for damage to W.D. vehicles arising while the vehicle was being used without authority made be laid down under section 40 A.A. and the particulars of the charge will include the damage as well as the unauthorized use of the vehicle.

10. LOSS OF MAILS
DRO 1876

1. Information has been received that the following mails for the Cdn Armed forces were lost by enemy action:
"Mails of all classes received at the Base Post office Canada, June 17th 1942 originating in the Province of Quebec and west, the approx. dates of posting varying between British Columbia June 12, and Ontario and Quebec June 16th.
Tobacco parcels despatched from Montreal received from Toronto companies on June 15th and 16th.

11. DISCIPLINE - CASES OF LOOTING
DRO 1677

1. At the Kent Summer Assizes at Maidstone, on 25 June 42 twenty soldiers of the South Eastern Command were charged with offences relating to looting. The cases came on for hearing before Mr. Justice Humphreys who imposed the following sentences:

Five sentences of penal servitude ranging up to 5 years.

Fifteen sentences of imprisonment with hard labor for one year and upwards.

12. DISCIPLINE - FRUIT CROPS
C.C.O. 405.

1. Attention of Coy commanders is drawn to the necessity for avoiding damage to and theft of fruit crops during the harvest season.
2. All orchards in the Cdn Corps district are normally placed out of bounds to tps, except as referred to in para 3 below.
3. In the case of formation exercises, Unit commanders may authorize the passage of tps on foot through orchards where this is tactically necessary for the success of the exercise.
4. Under no circumstances will orchards be used for parking vehicles or for bivouacs unless specifically authorized in advance by H.Q. of the formation carrying out the exercise.
5. Severe disciplinary action will be taken when loss of fruit is proven to be the result of pilfering or carelessness, on the part of Cdn Tps.

13. GRENADE No. 69, USE OF FOR TRG. PURPOSES.
OS RO 2361.

1. A number of serious accidents have recently occurred during trg. through ignorance of the capabilities of the No 69 Bakelite grenade. Compared with the No. 36 grenade the No. 69 is comparatively harmless. For this reason the No. 69 grenade is not usually handled with the respect shown to other types of grenade.

GRENADe No. 69 (CONTINUED)

2. The following safety rules for use of the No 69 grenade for trg. purposes are therefore made:
- (a) All ranks must be well acquainted with the details of this grenade as laid down in Small arms trg. Vol 1, Pamph 13(1942) lesson 5.
 - (b) The no 69 Grenade will only be used for trg. purposes as follows:
 - (i) During weapon trg. periods when men are actually being trained in throwing live grenades.
 - (ii) During exercises when live ammo. is being used, i.e. battle practices and field firing.
 - (iii) during properly supervised assault courses.
 - (iv) During exercises with tps when live ammo is not being used. No. 69 grenades will not be thrown except by instructors or umpires and then only if no thunderflashes are available.
 - (c) When used in place of thunderflashes during exercises the grenades will whenever possible, be thrown behind banks and into ditches. They will be thrown behind rather than in front of tps. to minimize the risk of eye injuries from flying fragments.
 - (d) No. 69 grenades will never be thrown at advancing tps.
 - (f) they will never be used at night for trg. purposes.
 - (g) These grenades will be thrown only on such ground as will ensure their being readily found if a blind occurs. All blinds are dangerous and must invariably be destroyed where they lie in the same way as other types of grenades. For this reason grenades must not in any circumstances be thrown into water.

14. BADGES OF RANK - WEARING OF ON OVERALLS AND JACKETS - Motorcycles
 70/S RO 2484

Badges of rank will be worn on:

- (i) Overall, combination
- (ii) Overall, blouses, denim.
- (iii) Jackets, motorcyclists, as follows:
 - (a) Officers - Worsted badges of rank with colored backing, as detailed in O/S RO 790, will be worn sewn directly on the shoulders seam.
 - (b) Warrant Officers and NCOs Chevrons and badges of rank will be worn on the right arm only, Attention is drawn to O/S RO 1228 para 1.

15. NEW TYPE OF GERMAN INCENDIARY BOMBS

1. The following information has been received from W.O. and is forwarded in order that it may be communicated, to all tps. For this purpose it may be published in Unit orders;
 The new types of German incendiary bombs have been widely used in the U.K.

- (i) As an ordinary 1 Kg incendiary bomb with an H.E. filled anti-personnel bomb fitted as an extension to the nose. Weight 2 kgs. overall length without tail seventeen inches. The anti personnel extension may break off and detonate separately. As the bomb falls a wire is released about 13 inches long attached to one end of a metal disc about one and half inches in diameter. The wire may be found some distance from the bomb and will give a clue to the type used.
- (ii) A bomb containing viscous mixture of oil, rubber solution, benzine and phosphorous. Similar in size to SC 50 kg. The bombs split open on impact by electric fuse and gain. Scatters liquid contents twenty to thirty yards. Contents burn skin if touched. The bomb can be recognized by red filler cap with rubber washer.
- (iii) SPRENGRAND C 50. Is similar to 50 kg H.E. can be recognized by nose filling plug. The nose of the bomb is filled with 12 lbs TNT. The upper part contains 6 firepots of magnesium electron type each shaped like a tumbler, two and three quarters inches diameter at the top and five and three quarters inches high, together with 67 metal containers filled with thermite, each 3 inches long and of triangular section about one inch side.

GERMAN INCENDIARY BOMBS (CONTINUED)

Impact type electric fuse scatters pre ignited contents of the upper part. TNT charge detonates after short delay.

1. SALE OF SURGICAL SPIRITS

1 CCO 415

1. Surgical spirits may only be purchased by soldiers on production of a certificate signed by a Medical Officer. Disciplinary action will be taken in any case of contravention of this order.

3. DEPENDENTS ALLOWANCE & ASSIGNED PAY

Missing personnel.

1. The following information is published for information of all ranks.

ART. 681, F.R. & II O/S

"Pay and allowances with the exception of rations and quarter allowance will be credited to the end of the month in which an officer or soldier dies or is reported missing. In the event of the officers or soldiers dying in a month subsequent to that in which reported missing, the account will be re-opened and credited to the end of the month in which the death occurs, or is presumed to have occurred. When an officer or soldier is later found to be alive, his account will be adjusted accordingly. If the missing officer or soldier is subsequently reported as a prisoner of war his case will be dealt with under Art 673 or 753 as the case may be (Pris. of War). Arts 673 and 753 provide that pay and allowances continue, but additional and special pay, in respect to officers, cease after 61 days and Tradesmen's rates of pay in respect of O.Rs ceases immediately. The provisions of the foregoing have been modified as shown below.
(Newspaper clipping)

"Parents and wives of soldiers reported missing in the Dieppe raid will continue to receive assigned pay and dependents allowances from three to six months under the standard practice of the Dependent's Allowance Board.

A soldier is not presumed dead until he has been missing for six months. Then the case is transferred to the Pensions Commission. National Revenue officials said soldier's wives especially those employed and making income subject to income tax may rest assured that their assigned pay and allowances for children are not taxable.

4. RATION ALLOWANCE - PRIVILEGE LEAVE.

A C.M.H.Q. Pay instruction is to be issued at an early date, regarding the marginally noted subject, as dealt with in C.A.O.R.O. 2459. Pending receipt of the above mentioned instruction the rates per diem are 2/9 for Officers and 3/2 for O.Rs. This allowance is payable for Privilege leave only, and not for 48hrs passes.

5. FINANCIAL REGULATIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE CDN ACTIVE SERVICE FORCE (OVERSEAS) AMENDMENTS No. 42
O/S RO 2459

1. Financial Regulations and instructions for the Cdn Active Service Force (O/S) are amended as follows:-

ARTICLE 789(3)

Cancel para and substitute:

2(3) A money allowance in lieu of rations at the rate provided for in para(2) above is authorized for officers and men who are not in receipt of subsistence allowance during periods of absence on ordinary leave, furlough or pass over 48 hrs. (See Art. 793 for allowance on sick leave.)

ARTICLE 789(4)

Cancel para and substitute:

"(4) A ration in kind or the money allowance in lieu will not be granted in the following cases:

(a) For officers or soldiers dieted in a military or civil hospital, prison or detention barracks, or in a lunatic asylum.

(b) For officers or soldiers absent without leave for more than 48 hrs.

(c) For days on which the officer or soldier receives travelling or subsistence allowance.

6. LEAVE TO EIRE
C.C.O. 413

1. Until further notice personnel will NOT be granted leave (other than on extreme compassionate grounds) to destinations in County Donegal (Eire) unless they have since 2 Sep 39 been immunized with T.A.B. vaccine against the enteric group of fevers in accordance with the regulations for the Medical services of the Army. Leave passes or certificates authorizing leave to Eire will specify the town of destination after which the county will be inserted in brackets.

7. CIGARETTES FROM CANADA - ILLEGAL SALE OR DISPOSAL
O/S RO 1360

1. It has come to notice that members of the Cdn Army receiving gifts or cigarettes from Canada are re-mailing them to civilians in the U.K. as gifts or otherwise. Attention is directed to R.O. 635 and 960 and it is again emphasized that the privilege extended by the British Government was only in respect of cigarettes or tobacco from Canada for personal use i.e. consumption by the recipient himself. The sharing of gifts or other gifts with other Cdn Army personnel and the free distribution by C.Os or other individuals of such gifts among Canadian Army personnel are exempted from the provisions of this Order.

2. The use of regimental funds for the purchase of cigarettes or tobacco in Canada for delivery in the U.K. and the sale of any duty free cigarettes or tobacco in messes and canteens are also contrary to the privilege extended by the British Government and are hereby forbidden.

8. UNDERCLOTHING - ISSUE OF TO PERSONNEL IN THE U.K. DURING WINTER MONTHS
O/S RO 2512

1. As it has been ascertained that considerable numbers of troops prefer to wear light underwear all the year round, approval is hereby given for the retention and maintenance of drawers, cellular, short throughout the year.

2. The issue of drawers woollen and vest woollen, during the winter period will not be made automatically as in the past, but only as and when individuals apply for such an issue.

9. DISCIPLINE - SALUTING
O/S RO 2492.

1. (a) Saluting is supposed to date from the days of armor, the salute representing the motions of a knight raising the vizor of his helmet with the open hand to the front, showing that, though raised it contained no missile. The practice of giving "eyes right" originated from the olden days when it was the privilege of men at arms to look their superiors in the face, while others must pass with downcast eyes. The salute therefore is no sign of subservience, it is a recognition of comradeship and mutual trust between men at arms. It is, at the same time, an acknowledgement of discipline, and a visible indication of the common obedience that all ranks owe to the Crown and its service. Saluting is thus another indication of the esprit de corps and discipline of a unit.

(b) The orders with regard to saluting are as follows:

(i) Officers under the rank of field officer will salute all officers of field rank and upwards. General officers and field officers will salute their superiors in rank. A salute made to two or more officers will be returned by the senior only.

(ii) Officers will salute their seniors in rank in the Naval and Air Services of the Empire.

(iii) Warrant officers, NCOs and men will salute all commissioned officers, including officers of the Naval and Air services of the Empire.

2. The officer saluted must understand that it is his duty not only to acknowledge the salute but to return it in a proper manner. He does so by saluting in the same way as the soldier, and not with a flick of a finger or the wave of his stick; nor will he return a salute with a cigarette in his mouth. When returning a salute he should look the man in the face so that the man gains the impression that his quality as a soldier is being appraised. He should also take a deliberate note of the badge that the man is wearing.

3. It is the duty of every officer not only to return salutes but also to see that he is properly saluted by those who should do so. An officer who salutes others who is confident of being saluted himself and who intends to return salutes properly, will rarely find it necessary to check a man.

4. The following points regarding saluting should be emphasized:

(a) Where a group of O.Rs pass a group of officers, all the O.Rs should salute in unison. The senior officer in the group will acknowledge the salute.

(b) When an officer passes a group of other ranks either all in a group will salute independently, or the senior other rank of the group will call the group to attention and the senior O.R. alone will salute.

(c) Santries with rifles will be instructed that excepting on operational Guard duty as defined in O/S RO 2343 the salute for the commission held by Majors and up is the Present Arms.

(d) All ranks will be instructed to salute cars carrying flags, as this indicates that a senior officer is in that car. This will not be interpreted as precluding the saluting of officers riding in cars not carrying flags.

(e) All ranks will be instructed in the proper method of saluting when the headgear is not worn. The fact that an officer is NOT wearing a headgear does NOT relieve his junior from paying the necessary compliments.

10 CONTROL OF PHOTOGRAPHY
O/S RO 2430

1. It is notified for information that para 5 of Defence Regulations provides that no officer or other rank shall unless acting in the course of his duty in His Majesty's service, make any photograph of or of any part of any object:

Control of Photography (Continued)

(a) In any such area in the U.K. as may be specified by order of a competent authority, being an area in relation to which the restriction of photography appears to that competent authority to be expedient in the interests of the defence of the realm or

(b) in any prohibited place within the meaning of the Official Secrets Act 1911, ~~ML~~ page 895 as amended by the Official Secrets Act 1920 ~~ML~~ page 900 that is.

(i) Any work of defence, arsenal, navy military or air force establishment or station, factory, dockyard, mine, minefield, camp ship, or aircraft belonging to or occupied by or on behalf of His Majesty or any telegraph, telephone, wireless or signal station or office so belonging or occupied and any place belonging to or occupied by or on behalf of His Majesty and used for the purpose or building repairing making or storing any munitions of war, or any sketches, plans, models or documents relating thereto, or for the purpose of getting any metals, oil or minerals of use in time of war.

(ii) any place not belonging to His Majesty where any munitions of war or any sketches models plans or documents relating thereto are being made, repaired, gotten or stored under contract with or with any person on behalf of His Majesty or otherwise on behalf of His Majesty, and

(iii) any place belonging to or used for the purpose of His Majesty which is for the time being declared by order of a Secretary of State to be a prohibited place for the purposes of this section on the ground that information with respect thereto, or damage thereto, would be useful to an enemy, and

(iv) any railway, road, way or channel, or other means of communication by land or water (including any works or structures being part thereof or connected therewith) or any place used for gas, water, or electricity works or other works for purpose of a public character, or any place where any munitions of war, or any sketches models plans or documents relating thereto are being made, repaired or stored otherwise than on behalf of His Majesty which is for the time being declared by order of a Secretary of State to be a prohibited place for the purpose of this section on the ground that information with respect thereto, or the destruction or obstruction thereof, or interference therewith, would be useful to an enemy.

2. It is to be noted that military hospitals, H.Q. barracks, billets camps and quarters are included in the abovementioned definition of prohibited places.

3. Officers and O.Rs except when they are acting in the performance of their duty, shall not take any photograph of the following subjects enumerated in para 1 of the Control of Photography Order No. 1 1939. The term duty shall be strictly interpreted by Commanding Officers. The taking of so called Unit record pictures, for War Diary or other purposes shall not be regarded as a matter of duty except for the official accredited military photographers on establishments of formation H.Q. Control of Photography Order No 1 1939 enumerates the following subjects.

(a) Any fortification, battery, searchlight, listening post or other work of defence.

(b) Any aerodrome or seaplane station.

(c) Any assembly of any of His Majesty's forces.

(d) any barracks, encampment or building occupied or in course of preparation for occupation by any of His Majesty's forces.

(e) any arsenal, factory, magazine or stores for munitions of war, arms, equipment or supplies.

(f) any wireless telegraph telephone signal or cable station.

(g) any dock, caisson dockyard, harbor, ship building works or loading pier

(h) any vessel of war either complete or under construction, or any vessel or vehicle engaged in the transport of supplies or personnel.

CONTROL OF PHOTOGRAPHY (CONTINUED)

- (i) any aircraft or the wreckage of any aircraft.
- (j) any building structure, vessel or other object damaged by enemy action.
- (k) any hospital, or station at which casualties whether civil or otherwise are treated, any ambulance or convoy or injured persons, or any injured person.
- (l) any electricity, gas or water works, or any gasometer or reservoir or any oil store.
- (m) any assembly of persons for the purpose of transport or evacuation or any temporary camp or other accommodation or transport vehicles used for the purpose of evacuation.
- (n) any riotous or disorderly assembly, or premises, or other objects damaged in the course of such an assembly.
- (o) any roads or railways exclusively connected with works of defence.

4. Where it is desired for unit records, photographs of subjects enumerated in para 1 Control of Photography Order No 1 1939 as above applications shall be made to the Public Relations Officer of the formation concerned for the services of an official military photographer.

5. Any photograph or photographs negative or photographic film which any officer, soldier attached civilian or employee of the Cdn Army O/S desires to send out of the U.K. will be contained in an envelope or wrapper plainly marked "Photograph".

6. Registration of Cameras- All ranks in possession of cameras will register them with the H.Q. of the formation or unit to which they are attached. It will be the responsibility of formation and Unit commanders that a list of all ranks in possession of cameras is maintained in their H.Q.

11. SECURITY MEASURES- PRIVATE CORRESPONDENCE
O/S R.O. 1089

1. The following regulations for the contents and transmission of correspondence of personnel of the Cdn Army O/S.

1. Allusions to any of the following matters are forbidden at all times in private correspondence during a war, whether relating to naval, military, or air forces or operations:

- (i) Strength, moral or physical state, or organization of any of His Majesty's or Allied Forces, including any comment on the absence or presence in the U.K. or any theatre of war of a unit or formation to which any unit is attached or belongs.
- (ii) location or movement or any naval, military or air force units or detachments arrival or lack of reinforcements.
- (iii) Armament or equipment of any kind.
- (iv) distinguishing signs used for the identification of formations, units, and their transports.
- (v) communications, such as the use condition or probable extensions of roads, railways or other transportation facilities, bridging operations, etc.
- (vi) Plans and forecasts or orders for future operations, whether known or merely rumoured or surmised.
- (vii) state of maintenance services, including any reference to reserves
- (viii) position or description of barracks billets, bivouacs, camps, training areas or schools.
- (ix) casualties before publications.
- (x) criticisms and statements calculated to bring into disrepute our forces or those of our allies.
- (xi) effect of any action by the enemy. Any remark which might tend if published to encourage the enemy, to cause despondency in our own forces or people, or to incite a feeling of hostility, among the people in the theater of war or in neutral countries.

2. Private correspondence will be in plain language, codes, ciphers, and shorthand are forbidden. It is forbidden either in the address or text of correspondence to connect the name of a place with that of a Unit, or the name of a unit, with the designation of an army post office.

3. Picturepost cards of the following categories will not be used:
 (a) Those disclosing the writers present or past location, or the route by which movements of the writers unit have taken place.
 (b) any aircraft of which photos have not been published in the press.
 (c) any coast lines or silhouettes which might be easily identifiable and reveal the position of aerodromes, defences and factories.
 (d) any factories (aircraft or otherwise) which have been built since 1 Sept 39.

4. It is forbidden to send, or to attempt to send to unauthorized persons:

(1) official documents including intelligence summaries, orders, reports maps, etc. or to disclose their contents except in the course of duty.

(2) any documents captured from the enemy or found in places occupied by the enemy and any documents containing any information about the enemy.

(3) any official document belonging to the civil authorities in allied or enemy territory.

5. It is forbidden to communicate with the Press except through the duly authorized channels (K.R.Can 417, 433, and 434)

6. It is forbidden to send through the post photos or films except those permitted by proper authority R.O./S 95. It is forbidden to despatch to neutral or enemy countries photos or pictorial matter of any kind, from whatever source they may have been obtained.

7. It is forbidden to insert advertisements or letters in any publication inviting correspondence with strangers, or to enter in correspondence with any stranger in response to such advertisements or invitations. The greatest caution and reserve are necessary in acknowledging presents from unknown donors, or in replying to trade circulars from unknown merchants and dealers, especially these in neutral countries.

8. It is forbidden to make use of the civil post service outside of the U.K. or therein when the Army Postal Service is available or to transmit correspondence by the hand of an officer, soldier or civilian proceeding outside the U.K. or a theater or operation, except by recognized military messenger service. Attention is directed to R.O./S 847.

9. Any man guilty of writing to a pen pal will in future be severely dealt with

11. BREACH OF SECURITY REGULATIONS

B.R.O. 384.

1. (a) M 27188 Tpr. G.C. MacPherson, 14 Cdn Army Tk Bn was tried by F.G.C.M. on 3, 4 and 5th Aug 42 in the field on two charges one of which was in the alternative, and was found guilty of a charge under A.A. Sec 4(6) relating to disclosing the location of certain military units, thereby calculated to imperil the success of part of His Majesty's Forces. He was on 5 Aug 42 sentenced to TWO YEARS Imprisonment.

(b) K53075 Tpr W.K. Hodge, 14 Cdn Army Tk Bn was tried by FGCM on 5 and 6th Aug 42 in the field on two charges, one of which was in the alternative, and was found guilty on a charge under A.A. Sec 4(c) relating to disclosing the location of certain military units, thereby calculated to imperil the success of part of His Majesty's forces. He was on 6 Aug sentenced to TWO YEARS Imprisonment.

12. ISSUE OF WARRANTS BY RTOs

C.C.O. 433.

1. Frequent cases are occurring of Cdn soldiers proceeding to Towns on pass on a single ticket, spending all their money, and, in order to return to their station, applying to the RTO for a return warrant.
2. These warrants are issued by RTOs on repayment, and in future, will be ONLY issued in cases of extreme urgency, such as loss of the return portion of a soldier's ticket, etc.

13. PRISONERS OF WAR, BRITISH - USE OF THE GERMAN WIRELESS

O/S RO 2537.

1. An International Convention provides for the names of all prisoners of war being reported to the Governments of the forces to which they belong as soon as possible after capture. This procedure is now in operation and experience has shown that the particulars of British prisoners in German hands reach the War Office about 21 days after capture. It is therefore, necessary to warn all ranks that should they be taken prisoner they may be invited for propaganda purposes to broadcast messages to their wives and families over the German wireless. Every officer and soldier must understand that should he be taken prisoner it is his duty to refuse to comply with any order, request or invitation to speak over the wireless on any subject or for any purpose. The use of enemy wireless to transmit messages is forbidden in all circumstances to Cdn prisoners of war who should be on their guard against being induced to disobey this instruction.

14. DISCIPLINE

B.R.O. 386.

1. It has been reported that the apple orchard at Hainaker Crossroads is being robbed.
2. Entering orchards is expressly forbidden and severe disciplinary action will be taken against any persons found disobeying this order.
