7. M.T. HOLIDAY TICKETS

1. The following points have been noticed in connection with the marginally noted:

(a) Some M.T. Holiday tickets have not been signed at all. (b) Personnel other than officers have signed tickets.

2. Only officers may sign tickets for transport holidays, and in doing so they must be prepared to explain to the Bde Commander reason for authorising the use of the vehicle.

3. When tickets are submitted to B.O.R. they must be complete and correct: these tickets must be in the B.O.R. by 1000hrs the flay following the vehicle holiday.

8. REDEMPTION OF DOMINION OF CANADA WAR SAVINGS CERTIFICATES

1. Provision has been made whereby War Savings Certificates registered in the name of a Canadian Officer or soldier will be redesmed by the Chief Treasury Officer (Overseas) provided that a period of six months has elapsed since the date of issue.

2. All ranks vishing to avail themselves of the above may obtain required application forms and information from the Paymaster through whom this redemption can be made.

9. PAYBOOKS - PERSONUEL PROCEEDING TO HOSPITAL P.O. 72

In future commanding officers will take action to ensure that, except in cases requiring emergency medical treatment, no soldier attends sick parade without Part I and Part II of his service and Paybooks. If his paybook is with the unit paymaster the soldier will obtain it before appearing on sick parade.

Unit paymasters will be informed daily of soldiers admitted to hospital, and if in an emergency case soldier has left without his paybook it will be forwarded at once by the unit paymaster to the paymaster of field ambulance, C.C.S. or hospital concerned. In order to ensure so far as possible that paybooks are in possession of the soldier, unit paymasters will regulate the number of books called in to be written up so that in no case will paybooks be retained more than 48 hours.

DISCIPLINE - ENTERTAINMENT OF PERSONNEL OF WOLLING SERVICES C.A.RO. 1540

- I. When dances or other entertainments are given by Officer's messes invitations will be extended with proper judgement and commensurate with good order and discipline. Subject to this, officers of the ATS, WRNS and WAAF may be invited into officers messes if so desired.
- 2. Other rank personnel of the Women's services will be treated in the same manner as the rank and file in the Army. The latter are not admitted to officers messes and therefore the same ban will apply to other rank personnel of the ATS, WRNS and WAAF.

11. ISSUE OF CAMOUFLACE MATERIAL BIO. 51

- 1. Attention is drawn to Cdn Corps Routine Order No. 573 dated 11 Dec 41.
- 2. In order to expedite the supply of canouflage material for urgent work direct distribution has been arranged from Corps and divisional camouflage stores (held at Engineer Bumps) by Officer i/c Camouflage stores after approval by corps camouflage officer.

 2. Indents for large quantities will first be referred to the Chief engineer or CRE of the formation concerned for decision before reaching dumps.

12. MATCHES - TRANSMISSION BY POST PROHIBITED B.R.O. 53

l. In view of the serious risk of damage to mails, matches of all kinds including safety matches, will on no account be sent by post to any address, whether inland or abroad, however, carefully packed. Matches come within the category of dangerous or explosive substances, and any person who sends or attempts to send matches through the post is laible to prosecution.

13. GUNS, MACHINE BREN -. 303 in.MK 1 - BREAKAGE OF BREECH BLOCKS B.R.O. 45

1. In order to prevent the breakage of breeck blocks of guns, machine bren .303 in MK 1 the following instructions are for the information and guidance of all concerned:

(a) Care should be taken in the removal of burrs from the square locking threads on the barrel and the barrel nut to prevent these components becoming loose. The measures to be taken by armourers for the removing of burrs from these locking threads, laid down in Instructions for armourers 1931, supplement No.2 Chapter 1, Sec 1V page 25 should not be overdone.

(b) Every effort should be taken in training to avoid breech blocks going forward from the rear position with the full weight of the return springs behind the when there is no round being fed into the chamber. Whenever possible under these conditions, the breach

15. WASTAGE OF COAL DRO 1525

1. South Eastern Army report that coal consumption within the Cdn-Corps shows and increase of 20% over normal expenditure.

2. Coal reserves have been seriously depleted by the recent cold wave, and unless drastic measures are taken to reduce wastage, a coal shortage is threatened.

3. Coy and detail commanders will ensure:

(a)That the basic ration of 66lbs per man per week is NOT exceeded (b)that coal fires will NOT be started in buts or billets before 1630 hrs daily except on authority of coy and detailcommanders.

(c) that any unit reserves held in excess of two weeks supply are reduced to that amount.

(d) that adequate measures are in force to control fuel consumption within each billet.

16. USE OF CAMOUFLAGE METS OF VEHICLES CRO 69

- l. It has been noticed that some vehicles are still being driven with camouflage nets in position, either tightly stretched over the vehicles or flapping in the breeze. This practice will cease forthwith as it serves no useful purpose and results in needless wear and tear of nets.
- 2. If the vehicle is likely to be halted in the open for any considerable time, canouflage nets should be used. The entire vehicle cannot be covered completely with the nets and it is important to make the best use of them. Most of the nets should be used on the shadow side so as to break up the regular outline of the vehicle. The garnished net should be extended across the vehicle supported upon any upright that will help to distrot the form of the vehicle.

 3. When vehicles have to remain stationary for long periods, the nets may be erected on a semi-permanent framework above the vehicle standings. The garnishing in t is case must conform to the ground
- pattern.

 4. When not in use, nets should be dried and stowed away in a corner of the vehicle and arc not to be left hanging on the vehicle. Where possible the nets should be placed in bags made of latrine hessian.

 5.. Where nets are either improperly garnished or unstructable they will be returned to Ordnance for replacements on the AFG 1098 seale of issue.

17. SECURITY (CARELESS TALK) D.R.O. 63

"Constant reports are being received of careless talk by soldiers when travelling and it has been particularly reported that much information is volunteered to mototists in casual conversation when giving men lifts in their cars. All ranks are again warned against talking about military matters and are especially cautioned against doing so when accepting lifts in cars"

18. <u>DUTY OFFICER PROCEDURE</u> B.RO. 64

1. For the duration of the war, it is essential that responsible officers are available at all times in Headquarters of Areas, formations, units and establishments to receive and act rapidly upon emergency telephone messages. These telephone messages might well demand immediate action e.g., on air raid varning, fires, collection or combating of enemy personnel or on a sudden move.

DUTY OFFICER PROCEDURE (CONTINUED)

"The individual selected for night duty will in all cases sleep beside the phone and the Os C. responsible will supply them with typed instructions as to the action to be taken in the event of an emergency.

"Officers and other ranks who are required to act on an emergency and are not in a Handquarters of areas, formations, units will rely either on hearing an air raid warning or will make arrangements with the nearest O.C. headquarters of unit to be awakened."

19. DISCIPLINE BRO 65

Owing the the regrettable number of ac idents involving loss of life which have occured during the hours of darkness it is considered desirable that the attention of all ranks should be drawn to the necessity of taking the normal precautions when walking in public thoroughfares at night when off duty or on duty as individuals. It should be pointed out that drivers of vehicles are often uhable to see pedestrians, particularly those dressed in khaki, in sufficient time to avert an accident. In places where no footway is in existance and it becomes necessary to walk in the roadway, pedestrian should walk on the right had side of the raod, i.e., against the oncoming traffic and not on the left hand side where there is always the danger of being run down from the rear by overtaking traffic.

All traffic signals must be observed and thoroughfares crossed only at the appointed pedestrians crossings, when these are available. The foregoing instructions whill be brought to the notice of all ranks at least once a month, in order that the loss of life throught lack of care and attention in this matter may be checked.

20. BATTLE DRESS - OFFICERS CARO 1567

1. On the introduction of battle dress, officers were permitted to provide themselves with garments made up in materials of the type used for their service dress garments, e.g. barathea whipcord.

2. In view of the present situation in regard to the supply of cloth and possible ddfficulties arising the the future from impergnation arrangements, this latitude in the choice of material for battle dress is hereby withdrawn.

3. Officers will in future obtain their battle dress on repayment from Ordnance stocks or have it made up from the material obtained on repayment from Ordnance stocks. This material is known as serge, service dress(Catalogue No.C.A. 0226-0228) and is that used footthe

battle dress of boher ranks.

21. CONSERVATION OF RUBBER AND PETROL DRO 1515

1. Attention is directed to CRO 56 dated 19 Jun which is repeated he cunder:

"In order to conserve petrol and rubber no motor vehicle will be used for journeys that can be preformed by public rail or bus services without prejudice to military interests."

22. DISCIPLINE - VIOLENCE AGAINST MIL. POLICEMEN

1. B73865 Pte.Osborne, G.W., B74077 Pte.Tweddle, E.A., B74252 Pte. Bailey, J.E. B74202 Pte.Suider, R.F. No.1 Cdn Inf Holding Unit, were tried jointly by Field General Court martial on 28 Nov 42 in the field in the United Kingdom, each on five charges and were found guilty on the following:

(a)A charge under A.A. Sec 10(2) relating to using violence against a military policeman on duty in the Guard room where they were in

custody.

(b) two charges under A.A. SEC 8 (1) relating to using violence against a superior officer in that they attacked two L/Cpls of Cdn Provost corps who were escorting them in arrest. (c)A charge under A.A. Soc 15(1) relating to bisence without leave

for a period of 36 days

(d)A charge under A.A. Sec 15(1) relating to basence without leave for one day, when in lawful custody until apprehended by military police, thereby incurring costs of apprehension amounting to £2-7-0

The offences under (a) and (b) were of a brutal and callous nature and might have resulted in serious permanent injury to the victims.

2. They were each on 28 Nov 41 sentenced to THREE YEARS PENAL SERVITUDE and to undergo stoppages of pay of £2-7-0.

3. The findings of the Court and the sentence were duly confirmed.

2. WEIRING OF SHOES BY OFFICERS AND O.R.S.

Reference Bn Order No. 4 dated 22nd Jan 1942 para 10: delete sub sec 2 Ib).

3. ECONOMY IN THE USE OF RUBBER SUPPLIES

1. It will be necessary under this new order to lay up 19 vehicles in the bn. that is, 5 more than are at present laid up. To do this it is suggested that each rifle coy lay up one more vehicle than they are at present doing, and that the transport sect. at Folkington lay up one morethan at present. This will mean that each rifle coy vill lay up three vehicles at all times, and seven vehicles will be laid up in the tpt lines.

2. It must be realized that this will curtail the M.T. activity of this Bn to a great extent, as even now practically all the unit tpt is being used for fatigues and work parties. However with intelligent management, it is felt that all the necessary work can continue without causing any inconvence, or sacrificing any efficiency.

4. DAMAGE CAUSED TO LIGHT MACHINE GUNS BY COMPETITIVE STRIPPING C.A.R.O. 1613

1. Complaints are being received that the barrels of Bren guns are becoming in some instances, loose, with consequent inaccuarate shooting The cause of this looseness is too frequent stripping and assembling of guns in units for instructional purposes, and in particular competitive handling exercises carried out against time.

2. Stipping for instructional and training purposes should be reduced to a minimum consistent with adaptate Enstruction and clearliness.

2. Stipping for instructional and training purposes should be reduced to a minimum consistent with adequate instruction and cleanliness Competitive handling exercises which include the stripping of the gun and changing of barrels against time will, in future, be forbidden. Test of Elementary Training No. 5 which allows ample time for changing of barrels will continue to be carried out, but not unnecessarily practised.

3. In so far as all small arms are concerned competitive stripping is forbidden.

5. CANADIAN CORPS BANDS

1. Authority is granted for the formation of nine Cdn Corps Bands to be mobilized in the Reinforcement Units but for employment with Field Formations and Units in appropriate circumstances.

2. This policy will provide the Cdn Army Overseas with bands of a high standard and will best serve the interests of the Cdn Army as a whole.

3. It is essential that the best qualified musicians available make up the band personnel and the necessity for the help and co-operation of the Field Units will be appreciated. It is requested that Formation and Unit commanders give this matter their personal attention.

4. Applications for auditions should be sent through the usual channels to CNHQ (A.G.1) and necessary arrangements will be made.

5. There are vacancies at this time for approx. 200 bandsmen and applications should be forwarded promptly.

6.INTEREST ON DEFERRED PAY C.A.R.O. 1631

1. Interest is allowed on a soldier's deferred pay balance in accordance with the provision with Art 740 F.R.& I (Overseas). This interest is calculated semi-annually by the Chief Treasury Officer(Overseas) and credited to the soldier's pay account kept in his office.

2. It has been the practice to furnish unit paymasters with lists

2. It has been the practice to furnish unit paymasters with lists giving particulars of such credits, from which lists the amount of accrued interest is entered in the soldier's pay book.

3. As the work involved in computing the interest, and in summarizing the information on unit lists, has increased very greatly, it is several months after the end of the interest period before the lists are received by Unit paymasters: consequently, it has been found that a large percentage of the soldiers listed have been transferred to other units, necessitating the forwarding of advice noted in all such

instances to the paymaster of the soldiers new unit.

4. In view of the difficulties experienced and the extent of the work involved in arranging for these credits to be posted in soldier pay books with the resultant expense, and as the individual credits represent very small amounts, no further entries covering interest on deferred pay balances will be made in the pay book of soldiers in respect of any paried of the pay book of soldiers

in respect of any period after 31 Dec 1940

INTEREST ON DEFERRED PAY(CONTINUED

5. In future interest on deferred pay balances will be computed every six months and credited to the soldiers pay account in Treasury records. When a soldier is either discharged in the U.K. or returned to Canada, the total of the interest credits will be entered in his pay book and on his last pay certificate, and the amount will be included in the balance paid to him on discharge.

7. MUSTER ROLLS

1. In accordance with C.A.R.O. No. 1278, muster rolls must be prepared with the following headings:

2. The column "Trade capacity" will only be filled in the case of personnel in receipt of trades pay 3. Muster rolls for the month of February will be submitted, in quadruplicate, to Bn Orderly Room, by 1700hrs 25th Feb 1942.

8. REQUISITIONING C.C.O. 97.

1. A number of complaints have been received that units have reco-

nnoitred properties without the sanction of the SAQC.

2. Instances have occurred where a number of reconnaissance parties have, from time to time, inspected houses without informing the SAQC concerned, and have thereby caused serious inconvenience and unnecessary trouble to the occupants. This is definitely contrary to the instructions in Cdn Corps "Guide to Quartoring."

3. No reconnaissance of property, with a view to requisitioning, will be carried outexcept as arranged in conjunction with the SAQC of the area. Neither will provate property be entered for this purpose until the consent of the SAQC has been obtained.

9. DRY CELLS C.C.O. 107

1. Where dry cells are left in instruments, telephones, vireless sets etc. which are not in constant use or where the dry cells has run down, electrolytic action occurs and corrosion occurs between cell and instrument. This corrosion in a very short time either ruins the instrument or makes heavy workshop repair necessary. Cells will be removed from all instruments, telephones, vireless sets, torches etc. which are likely to be in store for more than a week, and under no circumstances will the above instruments, etc. be returned to Ordnance depots or exchanged between units with the dry cells in the instrument.

10. PARCELS FOR SOLDIERS UNDER SENTENCE. B.R.O. 86.

1. When a soldier is under sentence of not less than 28 days or nore than six months detention of imprisonment, all parcels for delivery to such soddier received during the period of detention or imprisonment will be turned over to the Quartermaster of the appropriate reinforcement Unit for safekeeping pending release of the soldier. 2. The Quartermaster will keep such records as may be mecessary to show receipt and delivery of such narcels. If by reason of the nature of the contents it shall be necessary to dispose of a parcel before

PARCELS FOR SOLDIERS UNDER SENTENCE (CONTINUED)

3. In the event that when the soldier is taken on ration strength of the Reinforcement Unit, there shall be an accumulation of cigarettes in excess of 1000, the Quartermaster shall deliver to the soldier 300 cigarettes only and an acknowledgement that he holds for him the remainder. Thereafter he shall deliver to the soldier 300 cigarettes weekly until the accumulation has become exhausted. In the event of the soldier being moved to another Unit all cigarettes held shall be delivered to him.
