Petworth, England	19 1 Nov	Thu.	Weather: - clear, bright sunshine. The Bn. fell in at 1000 hrs this morning for inspection by Brig. K.G. Blackader, who commanded the 1st Bn. on mobilization and brought it overseas. Brig. Blackader chatted with some of the men who had been in the Unit at that time. After the inspection Brig. Blackader, and the C.O., Lt-Colonel V.E. Traversy addressed the men. In the afternoon the kits were turned in to the kit stores, and this was followed by a Pay parade. In the evening an ENSA show gave a performance in the camp.	
Petworth, England	2 Nov	.Fri.	Weather - clear. At 1000 hrs. this morning the men paraded to pick up their passes prior to proceeding on leave. Trucks conveyed us to Haslemere where a special train for London was awaiting.	I.

Petworth, England	9 Nov	Fri.	Weather - clear and cold with slight wind. The customary clearance after leave took place this morning. On Coy. parade the men were advised that a movement order has been received designating this draft as a part of the contingent going on the next sailing of the "Queen Elizabeth". Kits were drawn from kit stores and repacked in readiness to be picked up tomorrow morning. We shall probably be leaving here in the early hours of next Wednesday morning. A mail parade was held in the afternoon.	
Petworth, England	NON OL	Sat.	Weather - clear and cool. On Bn. Parade this morning the C.O., Lt-Colonel V.E. Traversy, addressed the men, advising them that we shall be sailing next Thursday, and should be in Montreal around the 21st of this month. A muster parade was then held, following which all kit bags were turned in, not to be seen again till Montreal is reached. Customary recreational transport was available to take the men to the nearby towns.	4

Petworth, England	ll N	Iov	7.Sun	Weather - bright, clear and warm. At 1000 hrs. this morning a Remembrance Day Service was held. This was a voluntary service, largely attended. As we shall soon be wearing our greatcoats many of the men spent the afternoon in pressing out the innumerable creases accumulated through the long incarceration of the coats in kitbags.	R
Petworth, England	12 N	Vo V	7.Mon	. Weather - overcast and cool. On the Bn. Parade this morning the function and ties of the Black Watch Association, in Montreal, was explained to the men, and all were given the opportunity of becoming members, most of the men doing so. All ranks were C.B. as from OOOl hrs. this morning. In the evening an ENSA show played in camp.	L.
Petworth, England	13 N		J.Tue	Weather - bright and clear. At 0800 hrs. all ranks fell in for Muster Parade, on which parade all the men received three packs of Canadian cigarettes. At 1400 hrs. a parade was called when Lt-Colonel V.E. Traversy, the C.O., spoke to the men, telling them of the arrangements which had been made for the reception in Montreal. As this was the last time we would all be together on parade, until the final parade in Montreal, he expressed to the men his appreciation of their service in the Black Watch, and more particularly while under his command. As the movement from this camp will be in two "lifts" the men were then divided into two groups. Just before midnight the men of the first lift had a snack in the kitchens. This is one night move about which there have been no grouses; morale is at an all-time high	
Southampton, England	14 1	10v	v.Wed	At 0050 hrs. the second lift paraded to the kitchen for a snack, and at 0100 hrs. the first lift moved off, followed one hour later by the men on the second lift. Two trains had been laid on to pick up the men when they arrived at Haslemere station, and as each man boarded he was given a Cdn. Army Mess Tin ration. Few of the men used this en route, spending the journey in sleeping. Immediately upon arrival at Southampton we boarded the "Queen Elizabeth", where we were conducted	K.

Southampton, England	14 N	ov.Wed	to our quarters on "D" Deck. As no breakfast was forthcoming the rations issued on the train were consumed at least in part. During the remainder of the day the men walked around the ship and watched troop train after tropp train disgorge their loads on the quay alongside. Two meals daily are served while on board, these being at 0800 hrs. and 1700 hrs.	
On Board "Queen Elizabeth"	15 No	v.Thu	Weather - clear and cool. At 0700 hrs. this morning the moorings were cast off and six tugs slowly edged the giant liner out of her berth. We steamed down Southampton water until 0930 hrs., when we were lying off the Isle of Wight. From 0930 hrs until 1510 hrs. the ship slowly circled thrice while the process of "swinging the compass", known only to the marine hierarchy, was pursued. During the afternoon the canteens were opened for the sale of cigarettes, candy, and coca-cola. The massed pipe band of the Black Watch, Essex Scottish, Queen's Own Cameron H, ghlanders and Calgary Highlanders, played on the Sports Deck in the afternoon, a dress rehearsal for a future date when they will play for the Earl and Countess of Athlone, passengers with us on this voyage. In the evening a light rain fell and the wind rose somewhat.	M.
On Board "Queen Elizabeth"	16 No	v.Fri	Weather - raining. Sea - moderate. Though the sea running was moderate some few of the men had moments of uncertainty. Boat drill enlivened the morning from 1100 hrs. until around noon. Movies are being shown on both the port and starboard sides of the promenade deck, four times daily. It was announced over the Public Address System that we had covered 601 nautical miles in the 24 hours since noon yesterday. In the evening a strong wind arose, causing a greater roll to the ship, but chasing away the rain.	K.

on Board 'Queen Elizabeth"	17 N	ov.Sat	Weather - cloudy with rain. Sea - moderate. This morning we ran through a belt of fog and the ship's horn was brought into frequent use. A very heavy rain squall was encountered shortly after 1000 hrs., continuing for upwards of half an hour. Our run for the day was announced as 692 nautical miles. In the evening the wind rose attaining almost gale velocity, causing the ship, large though she may be, to buck more than a little.	
On Board "Queen Elizabeth"	18 N	ov.Sun	Weather - variable. Wind - very high. Sea - rough. This morning there were two Protestant and three Catholic church services conducted on board. The roughness of the sea with its effect upon the feeling of the men cut down the attendance considerably. The adverse weather conditions caused a drastic reduction in the ship's mileage for the day only 557 nautical miles being logged. At 1400 hrs. a medical inspection of all ranks aboard was conducted. In the afternoon the massed pipe band played for the Earl and Countess of Athlone, who, due to some error in staff work, failed to put in an appearance. Later in the afternoon all C.Os. of Infantry Units aboard were invited to meet the Governor-General. In the evening we passed a ship, only the lights of which could be seen, the first vessel we have encountered since leaving British waters.	K
Halifax, N.S.	19 N	ov.Mon	Weather - bright sunshine, with cold wind. Sea - moderate. Though reveille was as usual at 0600 hrs. most of the men were up and about before that hour, looking for their first sight of land. It had been estimated that we would dock at 0500 hrs. but the inclement weather encountered yesterday set this back almost six hours. The mistiness prevailing at dawn was soon dispersed and the sun came out bright and clear. As neared Chebucto Point we received the escort of H.M.C.S. MICMAC, Canada's newest destroyer, and a flight of R.C.A.F. planes flying low overhead. As we neared the port of Halifax the massed pipe band, and the brass band of the South Saskatchewan Regiment appeared on deck to play us into the harbour. Many small boats loaded with civilians and service personnel came out to greet us.	

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## INEGITATION OF SIMULARY

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Remarks, references to Appendices and Summary of Events and Information Place Date Hour initials 19 45 19 Nov. Mon! (Cont.) Halifax. N.S. Coming into the harbour itself the boats in the basin and at the wharves, greeted us with their horns, with dock, factory and train whistles adding to the cacophony. As tugs edged our vessel closer to its pier the R.C.A.F. band standing there played the National Anthem and followed it up with many popular selections, and as we tied up, the Mayor of Halifax, Allan M. Butler gave us official welcome, - his speech being punctuated by the cheers of the men on the ship. The men hung over the rails and clung to the most precarious of perches in an endeavour to see all that was transpiring on the quay. Major I.H. Louson and RQMS U.R.L. Emo, from Montreal, were on hand to assist with the arrangements for getting us home in good order. The business of disembarking was soon commenced and continued steadily for the remainder of the day. In the evening a full moon shone on the quiet waters of the harbour. We were back in Canada! 20 Nov. Tue Weather - overcast and cool. We had been originally scheduled to disembark at En Route to 0500 hrs. but it was not until 0915 hrs. that we mustered on the Promenade Deck. Montreal. On the quay we were mustered in alphabetical order and allotted our berths on the Que. train, then filed aboard. In the station the Canadian Red Cross served coffee and doughnuts, and distributed magazines, cigarettes, gum, and apples. At 1100 hrs. the train pulled out. At many of the stations en route we were met by the Red Cross representatives with hot drinks and a bite to eat. In the evening snow fell heavily and the countryside through which we were passing was soon blanketed. Baggage tickets and the progremme of events laid on for our arrival in Montreal were distributed to all the men. The accomodation on the train was excellent, three men to a section, sleeping one up, and two down, with clean sheets and pillow-slips, and spring mattress provided. During the evening each man was given a leave pass, good until the 7th of January, ration coupons, and a priority slip for the purchase of a suit of clothes.

ontreal, Que.	21 No	ov.Wed	Weather - bright sunshine, becoming overcast, cold. The train was scheduled to reach Montreal around 1500 hrs. but the heavy snow during the night resulted in some delay, which, however, had been almost made up by the time we reached Levis, As the train approached Montreal, cleaning rags appeared and the men gave their brass and boots a final rub up. Shortly after 1400 hrs. we reached Point St. Charles station, where the packs were collected on trucks to be transported to Craig St. Drill Hall, and at 1500 hrs. the train pulled in to the Bonaventure terminal. The public and military reception committee at the station included Colonel P.P. Hutchison, Regimental Commandant, Maj-Gen. E.J. Renaud, C.B., C.B.E., D.O.C., M.D. 4, The Minister of National Defense, Hon. D.C. Abbott, Minister of National Health and Welfare, Hon. Brooks Claxton, Maj-Gen. A.E. Walford, C.B.E., M.M., E.D., Adjutant-General, and, representing the City of Montreal, Councillor W.R. Bulloch. In the station paymasters were on hand to change sterling into collars, and while the men were waiting in line for this, coffee, doughnuts and eigarettes were distributed. The Bn. then formed up and marched off. The route followed was Chaboillez Square, where we were joined by those men of the 1st Bn. who were already home, under the command of Lt-Colonel E. Motzfeldt, thence East on St. James St. to Victoria Square, where Gen. Renaud received the "Eyes Right". Continuing along St. James St. to St. Gabriel, North to Craig St. and East to the Drill Hall. As we marched along this route, deeply lined with spectators, the reception was tumultuous, and the roar sent up by the assembled friends and relatives in the drill hall as we entered, breath-taking. When the parade had formed up three very brief addresses of welcome were made by Councillor Bulloch, Maj.—Gen. Renaud, and Colonel P.P. Hutchison, and replied to, with even greater brevity by Lt-Colonel Traversy. Permission having been received from Maj.—Gen. Renaud, our C.O., Lt-Colonel V.E. Traversy, gave the f
